

In response to your recent request, we have reviewed the New York Natural Heritage Program database with respect to the environmental assessment for the potential wind energy development, located in the Towns of Hanover and Villenova, Chautauqua County.

Enclosed is a report of rare or state-listed animals and plants, and significant natural communities, that our database indicates occur, or may occur, on your site or in the immediate vicinity of your site. Also enclosed is a report of rare birds documented within 10 miles of the project site, for use in assessing potential impacts of bird collisions. (We have no records of rare bat hibernacula or roost sites within 40 miles of the site. However, we are currently in the process of entering Northern Long-eared Bat summer locations in our database. For more complete information on the proximity of the site to Northern Long-eared Bat summer locations, please resubmit your project for review in 2-3 months.) The impacts of wind turbines on animals include both impacts due to disturbance at the site of the turbines, and impacts due to flying birds and bats colliding with turbine blades. Therefore, when screening proposed wind energy projects for potential impacts on rare species, in addition to reporting rare plants and animals documented at the project site itself, NY Natural Heritage reports species of rare birds documented within 10 miles of the project site, and rare bats documented within 40 miles of the project site. This is in response to your November 23, 2015, letter regarding summer bat surveys conducted at the proposed Ball Hill Wind Project (Project) located in the Towns of Villenova and Hanover, Chautauqua County, New York. We offer the following technical assistance pursuant to the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531 *et seq.*).

Ecology and Environment, Inc., conducted summer presence/probable absence surveys for the northern long-eared bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*). We reviewed the results of the report dated November 2015. We understand that suspect positive northern long-eared bat calls were identified at several locations. We look forward to providing technical assistance in the future to help conserve the northern long-eared bat at this site.

Any additional information regarding the Project and its potential to impact listed species should be coordinated with both this office and with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Region 9 Office.

Thank you for requesting the comments of the New York State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). We have reviewed the *Addendum #2 Archaeological Survey for the Ball Hill Wind Project*, prepared by Panamerican Consultants and dated December 2015, in accordance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966. These comments are those of the SHPO and relate only to Historic/Cultural resources. They do not include other environmental impacts to New York State Parkland that may be involved in or near your project. Such impacts must be considered as part of the environmental review of the project pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act and/or the State Environmental Quality Review Act (New York Environmental Conservation Law Article 8).

Based on this review, the SHPO concurs that no additional Phase IB archaeological survey is warranted given that the Area of Potential Effects (APE) has been reduced by 46.2 acres and the low archaeological sensitivity of the 2015 Ball Hill Wind Project configuration.

The Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation (OPRHP) has been asked for comments on this undertaking by the project sponsor. We are providing these comments as part of what we anticipate will be a coordinated Section 14.09 (NYPRHPL) review as part of the applicant's need to have the project certified by your agency. These comments are provided by the Division for Historic Preservation and relate only to Historic/Cultural resources. They do not include potential environmental impacts to New York State Parkland that may be involved in or near the project. Such impacts must be considered as part of the environmental review of the project pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act (New York State Environmental Conservation Law Article 8) and its implementing regulations (6 NYCRR Part 617).

This letter is to inform your agency that we have received a request to evaluate properties for potential historic/cultural significance. The material submitted was based on our agency's *generic wind farm survey guidance* (2006). The evaluated survey area, as defined by our guidance, was a five-mile radius drawn around each of the individual turbine sites. The outer edges of these circles are connected by tangent lines thus producing a five-mile survey area around the entire project. It was also recommended that for an analysis of potential visual impacts to historic resources that the next step was to determine sight lines based on topographic features and the locations and maximum heights of each turbine.

The request for resource evaluation was received on August 30, 2013. It consisted of two volumes, entitled: Archaeological and Architectural Survey for Duke Energy Ball Hill Windpark Addendum, Towns of Villenova and Hanover, Chautauqua County, New York (May 2013, Panamerican Consultants, Inc.) and Ball Hill Windpark Visual Resource Assessment (June 2013, Saratoga Associates). The archaeological and architectural survey report addendum accounts for changes in the project layout and area of potential effect (APE) since the initial report (Longiaru et al. 2008). The current configuration for the Duke Energy Ball Hill Windpark is approximately 15 acres larger than the APE surveyed in 2008. The 2013 report recommends the excavation of 240 shovel tests within the additional 15 acres to concur with the OPRHP guidelines. Based on our review of the materials, OPRHP concurs with this recommendation.

The OPRHP determined that 121 of the resources surveyed in 2008 were eligible for inclusion in the New York State and National Registers of Historic places (SR/NRE). In addition to these properties, the 2013 addendum report identified eight individual properties and one historic district (the Center Street Historic District) within the project area. It also recommended four additional contributing properties to the NRE Silver Creek Historic District. Based on our review of the report, OPRHP has determined that all of the identified resources are SR/NRE. A full list of our assessments and resource evaluations are attached to this letter as *Appendix A*.

In our initial letter, dated September 24, 2008, OPRHP determined that under Section 14.09 1(c) of New York State Parks and Recreation Law, the undertaking would have an *Adverse Impact* upon cultural resources. In light of the additional information provided regarding cultural resources in the expanded project area, OPRHP's assessment has not changed. Please see our initial letter, attached, for our recommendations regarding visual analysis and potential mitigation. All consultation regarding avoidance and mitigation should involve the state and federal agencies directly associated with the permitting and approval process for this project.

At this point in time, we have concluded our evaluation of eligible resources and the potential impacts to those resources associated with this project. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Cottage Grange No. 829 was organized in the Village of Cottage in 1897. Within a decade, the grange hall was built. Local histories indicate that the first local grange meeting was held in the building on October 7, 1908. The Cottage Grange No. 829 is significant under Criterion A in the area of agricultural and social history for its association with the state and national grange movement. In addition to serving as a central location for grange meetings, the hall also served as an all-purpose community center. The Cottage Grange No. 829 is a remarkably intact example of a vernacular building constructed as a grange hall. The front-gabled, frame building is two bays wide and four bays deep. The entrance, which has double-leaf paneled doors and a transom, is offset to the right side of the façade. It is flanked by a two-over-two sash window. Two two-over-two sash windows and a simple wooden grange sign are on the second story of the façade. A brick chimney is visible over the roofline. A one story, front gabled addition was built to the rear of the structure.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Cottage Methodist Church, built in 1846, is eligible under Criterion C as an early example of rural vernacular Italianate architecture. The Church was incorporated in 1845 with a congregation of 60, and was constructed the following year at a cost of \$2,500. The one-story, front gable church features a tall, central tower with decorative brackets, a belfry with tripartite arched openings, and a mansard roof. The entrance, which is in the tower, has been modified but retains its original fanlight and pediment. Two sets of paired, round arched windows flank the central entrance. Three sets of paired, round arched windows pierce the east and west elevations. A side entrance and small, front-gabled shed addition are located on the east elevation. Though the façade has been covered in vinyl siding, the original clapboards are visible on the other elevations.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

7 Third Street, built during the late nineteenth century, is significant under Criterion C as an intact Italianate residence in Forestville. The two-story, front gabled house has clapboard siding and a stone foundation. The three-bay-wide house features an entrance in the right bay with a segmental arched door frame, transom, and $\frac{3}{4}$ sidelights. The five windows on the façade, one in each bay, are segmental arched windows with hooded window crowns; the original sash has been replaced. A polygonal bay extends from the left elevation. A one-story wing, which has matching detailing, extends from the rear of the building. A new entrance and shed-roofed, one-story side porch are recent additions.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

10 Main Street, located in the Village of Forestville, is significant under Criterion C as a representative example of a late nineteenth century commercial building. It is the only remaining wooden storefront on Main Street in Forestville. The two-story building has a shed roof culminating in a wide overhanging wooden cornice with paired decorative brackets. The original, first floor storefront has a large, offset plate glass window divided by wooden pilasters. The windows are framed by one entry door on the left side of the façade, and two on the right side. Six replacement windows, four of which are in two paired sets, run along the second story.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Center Street Historic District appears to be eligible under Criterion C as a cohesive and intact grouping of nineteenth century architecture in Forestville. Densely settled along Walnut Creek, Forestville is split into two sections by Main Street / NY 39. The Center Street Historic District is located in the area north of Main Street. This section is characterized by mid-to-late nineteenth century residential buildings sited on narrow parcels with tree-lined streets and pedestrian rights of way. The properties included in this district represent intact examples of the Greek Revival, transitional Greek/Italianate, Italianate, Gothic/Italianate, and Queen Anne styles.

This DOE is based on the limited information provided in the 2013 Archaeological and Architectural Survey for Duke Energy Ball Hill Windpark Addendum, Towns of Villenova and Hanover, Chautauqua County, New York by Panamerican Consultants (08PR01814). Future surveys are recommended to determine whether the boundaries of this should be expanded.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Harrison House, built during the 1880s, is significant under Criterion C as good example of an Italianate style rural tavern. The two-story frame building sits on a corner lot and features wrap-around porches on the first and second stories. A canted corner entrance leads to the two entrances on the first floor. Each features a fanlight transom and sidelights. Though the windows have been replaced, the original segmental arched surrounds have been retained. A pedimented parapet with paired round arched windows and decorative cornice brackets crowns the façade. The current porch has a poured concrete foundation, and is not original; the pattern of the porch piers and existence of a porch is consistent with historic photographs. The left porch bay on the north façade has been enclosed.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The L.J. Pierce Hose House No. 1, built in 1896, is the first hose house built in Forestville. It is significant under Criterion A for its association with local rural fire protection efforts. The two-story, frame building features a gabled parapet with a round vent and brackets. While the original double bay and single bay doors on the ground floor are still extant, the second-story windows have been enclosed. The window openings along the side elevations remain, but many have been boarded. Historic photographs indicate that a bell cote and wet-hose tower were originally located along the gable roofline. Neither of these structures remain. Despite these modifications, the basic form of the building retains its integrity.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Silver Creek Historic District is eligible under Criterion C as a cohesive grouping of residential and commercial architecture along the primary road corridor in Silver Creek. Based on the limited information provided, the approximate boundaries for the district include a three-block section of Main Street (US Route 20) from Central Avenue (US Route 5) to Robinson Street; the Village Park bound by Park Place, Main Street, and Central Avenue; and a section of Central Avenue (US Route 5) from Main Street to 199-201 Central Avenue. Future analysis of the boundaries and possible additional areas of significance is warranted. The district includes approximately 39 properties dating from the mid-nineteenth century through early twentieth century. Most of these properties are residential, but the district also includes a village park, commercial buildings, religious buildings, a post office, and a school.

The village was originally surveyed during a cultural resources reconnaissance survey for the New York State Department of Transportation in 1990s (Chautauqua County Report No. 153). The authors of the report did not recommend any districts. After reviewing the report, NYSHPO staff made a preliminary determination that this area was eligible as a historic district. This DOE is based on the limited information provided in the 2013 Archaeological and Architectural Survey for Duke Energy Ball Hill Windpark Addendum, Towns of Villenova and Hanover, Chautauqua County, New York by Panamerican Consultants (08PR01814).

St. Peter's Episcopal Church, built in 1859, is eligible under Criterion C as an intact example of a Carpenter Gothic church. The one-story, board and batten-sided church has a steeply-pitched front gable roof with a front gable belltower. Half the height of the church, a one-bay enclosed entry porch with double-leaf wood entry doors is centrally located on the façade. A small wooden cross is attached to the gable roofline of the entry porch. The entry porch is flanked by pointed arched stained glass windows. A trefoil is cut into the siding above the entry porch. Each of the side elevations has three pointed arched stained glass windows. A one-story, side gabled addition with board and batten siding adjoins the rear of the church.

We are providing these comments as part of what we anticipate will by a coordinated Section 14.09 (NYPRHPL) review as a result of the applicant's need to have the project certified by you agency. These comments are provided by the Field Services Bureau and relate only to Historic/Cultural resources. They do not include potential environmental impacts to New York State Parkland that may be involved in or near the project. Such impacts must be considered as part of the environmental review of the project pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act (New York Environmental Conservation Law Article 8) and its implementing regulations (6 NYCRR Part 617).

This letter is to inform your agency that we have received a request to evaluate properties for potential historic/cultural significance. The material submitted was based on our agency's generic wind farm survey guidance (2006). The evaluated survey area, as defined by our guidance, was a five-mile radius drawn around each of the individual turbine sites. The outer edges of these circles are connected by tangent lines thus producing a five-mile survey area around the entire project. It was also recommended that for an analysis of potential visual impacts to historic resources that the next step was to determine sight lines based on topographic features and the locations and maximum heights of each turbine.

The request for resource evaluation was received on August 15, 2008. It consisted of a singlevolume report titled: Architectural Survey (Five-Mile APE) for the Proposed Noble Ball Hill Windpark (July 2008, Panamerican Consultants, Inc.). This document identified a total of 146 individual properties within the survey area. The survey identified 132 individual buildings and one historic district (the Ewing Park Historic District). Based on our review of the materials the NYSHPO has determined that 121 of the individual resources are eligible for inclusion in the New York State and National Registers of Historic places (SR/NRE). An additional 13 out of 14 identified properties are included as contributing features in the Eligible Ewing Historic District. Eight identified bridges remain unevaluated at this time. Lastly, three buildings were determined not to meet the eligibility criteria. A full list of our assessment is attached to this letter as Appendix A.

The eligible resources identified in the survey report are diverse in both nature and their physical settings. Properties that will be in the view shed of the project include those in established village/hamlet settings as well as resources that occupy open rural agricultural settings. With few exceptions the scale of the building stock is limited to the height of single and two-story residential, commercial and agricultural buildings with few non agricultural elements breaking the treetops in this sparsely populated area.

Within the survey area, this agency has identified several key loci where visual impacts should be carefully assessed. These areas encompass the villages of South Dayton, Silver Creek, Hamlet and Forestville as well as several highly intact farmsteads. Many of these resources will be in the viewshed of a significant number of the proposed towers. Given the undulating and sharply elevated topography of this area the potential viewshed/setting impacts associated with these resources should be carefully assessed. All resources where this office believes additional visual assessments should be undertaken have been identified in *Appendix A* with an asterisk (*). We would recommend that your agency seek to have appropriate visual simulations generated to better understand the full extent of the potential visual impacts associated with this project.

Although the full extent of potential impacts from the proposed undertaking cannot be assessed absent simulations as part of a comprehensive visual analysis, OPRHP believes that sufficient information does exist to determine that under Section 14.09, 1(c) of New York State Parks and Recreation Law, the undertaking will have an *Adverse Impact* on cultural resources. The introduction of the sleek, ultramodern, approximately 389 foot tall kinetic wind turbines (up to 60 proposed) throughout this scenic landscape forever alters and changes the rural setting, which itself is a significant element in much of the survey area and serves as the backdrop for the architectural, cultural and scenic tourism heritage of these communities.

We would recommend that the applicant utilize the visual analysis as a tool to aid in the exploration of feasible and prudent alternatives that avoid the adverse impact(s). The assessment of potential impact avoidance options may include a reduction in turbine numbers and/or height, relocation of turbine units, and various screening options. We would recommend that only after an assessment of avoidance options has been established should potential mitigation options be discussed. All consultation regarding avoidance options and potential later mitigation options should involve those state/federal agencies directly associated with the permitting/approval process for this project.

At this point in time we have concluded our evaluation of eligible resources and the potential impacts to those resources associated with this project. Please be aware that we will be asking the project sponsor for GPS data gathered as part of the survey.
