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1. Overview

1.1 Project Description

Northland Power Solar Glendale L.P. (hereinafter referred to as “Northland”) is proposing to develop a 10-MW solar photovoltaic project titled the Glendale Solar Project (hereinafter referred to as the “Project”). The Project will be located on approximately 45 hectares (ha) of land, in the Township of South Glengarry, within the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry (Figure 1.1).

1.2 Legislative Requirements

Ontario Regulation (O.Reg.) 359/09 – *Renewable Energy Approvals Under Part V.0.1 of the Act*, (herein referred to as the REA Regulation) made under the *Environmental Protection Act* identifies the Renewable Energy Approval (REA) requirements for renewable energy projects in Ontario. Per Section 4 of the REA Regulation, ground-mounted solar facilities with a nameplate capacity greater than 10 kilowatts (kW) are classified as Class 3 solar facilities and do require a REA.

Consultation is a requirement of the REA process as stipulated by Sections 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18 of REA Regulation. In addition, the Ministry of the Environment (MOE) has prepared draft guidelines called “*Technical Bulletin Five - Guidance for Preparing the Consultation Report*” (MOE, 2010) outlining the Ministry’s expectations and guidelines for appropriate consultation, including the development of a Consultation Report as part of the REA application package. This Consultation Report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the REA Regulation and the MOE Technical Bulletin.

The “*Technical Guide to Renewable Energy Approval*” (MOE, 2011a) outlines further recommendations regarding the consultation process. The information provided in this technical guide was incorporated into this report. Further, an additional guidance document titled “*Draft Aboriginal Consultation Guide for preparing a Renewable Energy Approval (REA) Application*” (MOE, 2011b) provided additional information and guidance on Aboriginal consultation. The information presented in this guide is incorporated into this report, where required.

Table 1 in the REA Regulation requires the Consultation Report to include

- a summary of communications with any members of the public, aboriginal communities, municipalities, local road boards and local services boards regarding the Project
- evidence that the information required to be distributed to aboriginal communities under Subsection 17(1) was distributed
- any information provided by an aboriginal community in response to a request made under paragraph 4 of Subsection 17(1)
- evidence that a consultation form was distributed in accordance with Subsection 18(1)
- the consultation form distributed under Subsection 18(1), if any part of it has been completed by a municipality, local roads board or local services board
- a description of whether and how:

- ◆ comments from the members of the public, aboriginal communities, municipalities, local roads boards and local service boards were considered by the person who is engaging in the project
- ◆ the documents that were made available under Subsection 16(5) were amended after the final public meeting was held, and
- ◆ the proposal to engage in the project was altered in response to comments made from members of the public, aboriginal communities, municipalities, local roads boards and local service boards.

1.3 The Consultation Process

Pursuant to O. Reg. 359/09, consultation conducted for the Project has included adjacent landowners, government agencies (e.g., Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR), MOE, Conservation Authorities, etc.), local municipalities (upper and lower tier), aboriginal communities and the public. The objectives of the consultation process have been to obtain information about the Project location, identify issues and potential concerns, and to identify potential impacts associated with the Project and potential means of mitigating those impacts. As well, the consultation process has been used to identify specific stakeholders as a means to establish open and meaningful dialogue between Northland and the stakeholders.

Local road boards and local service roads are not present in the Project area. Therefore, no consultation is possible with such bodies for the project.

The following report provides

- an outline and description of all consultation activities held for this Project for the public, government agencies, including municipalities and Aboriginal communities
- a summary of comments from public, government agencies and Aboriginal communities
- a summary of how these comments were incorporated into the REA process.

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2. Consultation with the Public

2.1 Methods of Consultation

The methods of consultation for the Project include the requirements identified in the REA Regulation, as well as additional measures deemed necessary to ensure adequate consultation with the public. A wide variety of consultation methods increases the amount of public awareness and participation. The methods of consultation for this Project included:

- Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project/Notice of Public Meeting
 - ◆ direct mail to all stakeholders (including identified landowners within 120 m of the Project location); a complete list is provided in Appendix A. A total of 13 notices were issued on August 4, 2010 for the first public meeting.
 - ◆ posting on two separate occasions on Wednesday, August 4, 2010 and Wednesday, August 11, 2010 in *The Glengarry News*, which has general circulation in the Project area. These notices are included in Appendix B
- Updated Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project/Notice of Public Meeting
 - ◆ direct mail to all stakeholders (including all landowners within 120 m of the Project location, as well as interested parties identified through Public Consultation efforts); the complete is provided in Appendix A. A total of 31 notices were issued on July 5, 2011 for the second public meeting.
 - ◆ posting on two separate occasions on Wednesday, July 6, 2011 and Wednesday, July 13, 2011 in *The Glengarry News*, which has general circulation in the Project area. These notices are included in Appendix B
- Notice of Final Public Meeting
 - ◆ direct mail to all stakeholders (including all landowners within 120 m of the Project location, as well as interested parties identified through Public Consultation efforts); the complete is provided in Appendix A. A total of 31 notices were issued on July 28, 2011 for the final public meeting.
 - ◆ posting on two separate occasions on Wednesday, August 3, 2011 and September 7, 2011 in *The Glengarry News*, which has general circulation in the Project area. These notices are included in Appendix B.
- a website (www.northlandpower.ca/Glendale) with Project and Northland information, Notices and Project documents posted when available
- hard copies of the Project Description Report and supporting Project documents available for review at the Township of South Glengarry municipal office
- three public meetings
- meetings with local residents

- providing means to obtain comments on the Project by having comment sheets available at first and final public meetings and advertisement of phone numbers, fax and emails for the public to make comments
- one hard copy of Draft Project Description Report available at the first two public meetings and all the Draft REA project documents available for review at the final public meeting
- handouts (printed copies of boards) available at the public meetings.

Through these methods, information, questions, comments, feedback and concerns regarding the Project were obtained and then utilized and addressed, as discussed in the following sections.

2.2 List of Stakeholders

A list of property owners within 120 m of the Project location was determined through consultation with the Township of South Glengarry and the Township of South Stormont.

As correspondence was received from members of the public and other organizations regarding the Project, newly identified names and contact details were added to the public mailing list. For example, if any attendees of the first public meeting provided their mailing address, this address was added to the mailing list. Appendix A contains a copy of the public stakeholder list that was used for distribution of the Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project/Notice of Public Meeting and the expanded public stakeholder lists that were used for distribution of the updated Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project/Notice of Public Meeting, as well as the Notice of Final Public Meeting.

2.3 Details and Results of Consultation

The following sections provide information on the details of the consultation completed and the results.

It should be noted that between the formalized consultation activities, all stakeholders were encouraged to provide comments or questions via telephone, fax, email or mail at any time during the consultation process. Stakeholders were also encouraged to provide any concerns early in the process. Where relevant, a response was provided for each question or comment received, either directly (i.e., at the public consultation sessions) or through the same medium through which the submission was made. All comments and concerns, responses, and the impact to the Project are provided in this report.

2.3.1 First Public Meeting and Notice

The Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project and Public Meeting was published 30 days prior to the event in the *Glengarry News* on Wednesday, August 4, 2010 and again on Wednesday, August 11, 2010. The *Glengarry News* is a local paper with weekly publication, circulating from Alexandria, Ontario into the surrounding historic Glengarry County, which includes the Township of South Glengarry. Notices and covering letter were sent by regular mail to all identified landowners within 120 m of the Project location. A total of 13 stakeholders were mailed a notification on August 4, 2010. The letters are contained in Appendix B along with the Notices published in the *Glengarry News*.

The Notice and Draft Project Description Report (PDR) were posted on the Project website, northlandpower.ca/glendale, at the same time the Notice was published. The PDR was also made

available for public review at the Township of South Glengarry municipal office 30 days prior to the first public meeting.

The first public meeting was held on Wednesday, September 8, 2010 from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. at the Char-Lan Recreation Centre, Community Hall (19740 John Street, Williamstown, Township of South Glengarry, ON), with a purpose to achieve the following:

- introduce Northland and the Project to the community
- identify the Project contacts and avenues for comment or question submission
- solicit feedback on the Draft Project Description Report.

A total of 27 people signed in at the first public meeting.

Project information was provided on display boards set up at the public meeting and handouts of the display boards were made available to the public. Appendix C contains a copy of the display boards. A paper copy of the PDR was also made available for review at the first public meeting.

During the public meeting, questions were answered by Northland (e.g., typically Project specific questions) or by Hatch (e.g., typically REA process or environmental impact questions).

Feedback obtained from the first public meeting was used to provide direction for the scope of the assessment and ensure that local issues would be addressed as appropriate. Comment sheets were offered at the public meeting to all attendees as means to obtain and record comments and concerns as well as pertinent background information about the Project location.

Two (2) comment sheets were received during or following the first public meeting (see Section 2.4 for comments and responses). Appendix C contains copies of the comment sheets.

2.3.2 Second Public Meeting and Notice

The Notice of Public Meeting was published 30 days prior to the event in the *Glengarry News* on Wednesday, July 6, 2011 and again on Wednesday, July 13, 2011. An updated mailing list, including any newly identified names and contact details was used for the mail out (see Appendix A). A total of 31 stakeholders were mailed a notification on July 5, 2011. The letters are contained in Appendix B along with the Notices published in the *Glengarry News*.

This additional public meeting was to provide information on a change in the Project location as a result of the acquisition of additional lands for the Project.

The Notice and updated Draft Project Description Report (PDR) were posted on the Project website, northlandpower.ca/glendale, at the same time the Notice was published. The PDR was also made available for public review at the Township of South Glengarry municipal office 30 days prior to the first public meeting.

The second public meeting was held on Monday, August 8, 2011 at 5:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. at the Char-Lan Recreation Centre, Community Hall (19740 John Street, Williamstown, Township of South Glengarry, ON) with a purpose to achieve the following:

- introduce the revised Project location
- identify any potential concerns with the Project

- solicit feedback on the Draft updated PDR

A total of 2 people signed in at the second public meeting.

Project information was provided on display boards set up at the public meeting and handouts of the display boards were made available to the public. Appendix D contains a copy of the display boards. A paper copy of the updated PDR was also made available for review at the second public meeting.

During the public meeting, questions were answered by Northland (e.g., typically Project specific questions) or by Hatch (e.g., typically REA process or environmental impact questions).

Feedback obtained from the public meeting was used to provide direction for the scope of the assessment and ensure that local issues would be addressed as appropriate. Comment sheets were offered at the public meeting to all attendees as means to obtain and record comments and concerns as well as pertinent background information about the Project location.

No comment sheets were received during or following the second public meeting. A copy of the sample comment sheets that were available at the public meeting are found in Appendix D.

2.3.3 Final Public Meeting and Notice

The Notice of Final Public Meeting was published 60 days prior to the event in the *Glengarry News* on Wednesday, August 3, 2011 and again on Wednesday, September 7, 2011. An updated mailing list, including any newly identified names and contact details was used for the mail out (see Appendix A). A total of 31 stakeholders were issued covering letters and the Notice of Public Meeting on July 28, 2011. A copy of this Notice as it appeared in *Glengarry News* and a copy of the letter that accompanied the Notice are provided in Appendix B.

The purpose of the final public meeting was to solicit feedback on the content and the findings of the reports prepared for the Project. Draft copies of the Project documents required to be prepared under the REA process were made available for public review on July 29, 2011, at the Township of South Glengarry municipal office. Copies were posted on the Project website. These Project documents included the following:

- Executive Summary (including summaries of the following documents and Letters of Confirmation)
- Project Description Report
- Construction Plan Report
- Design and Operations Report
- Decommissioning Plan Report
- Noise Study Report
- Stage 1 and 2 Archaeological Assessment Report
- Water Body Assessment Reports
- Natural Heritage Assessment Reports.

The final public meeting was held on Monday, October 3, 2011 from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Char-Lan Recreation Centre, Community Hall (19740 John Street, Williamstown, Township of South Glengarry, ON), with a purpose to achieve the following:

- provide the community with detailed information about the Project
- solicit feedback on the content and the findings of the REA reports
- answer any questions about the Project
- obtain any comments or concerns with respect to the Project.

A total of two people signed in at the final public meeting.

The final public meeting followed an open house format with project details presented on display boards and printed copies available to visitors. This approach allowed for one-on-one discussions between representatives of Northland, Hatch and the public. Display boards provided general information on Northland and Project, with an overview of the information found in the Project documents. A copy of the Project documents were available for review and discussion at the final public meeting. Copies of this information can be found in Appendix E. Questions at the final public meeting were answered by both Northland and Hatch. Comments sheets were available at the second meeting to be filled in by the participants if they chose to do so. Northland Power and Hatch staff kept notes of conversations with attendees and also encouraged attendees to fill out comment sheets. No comment sheets were completed as a result of the final public meeting. A copy of the sample comment sheets that were available at the public meeting are found in Appendix E.

Table 2.1 provides information on how these comments were addressed and incorporated into the finalization for these reports, as appropriate.

2.3.4 Other Public Consultation

The public was encouraged to communicate with the representatives from Northland and Hatch outside of the public meetings via any of the following forms of communication:

- email correspondence
- phone calls
- mail
- fax.

No additional correspondence from the public has been received beyond those provided at or in response to the public meeting.

2.4 Public Comments and Concerns

The comments and/or concerns that were obtained from the public (e.g., comment sheets, emails, verbal discussions, etc) during the Project consultation process along with the response and/or resulting actions taken to address each concern are provided in Table 2.1. Where applicable, the response also provides reference to where more detail can be found in the Project documents prepared under the REA Process. Additionally, any changes to the Project documents and/or to the Project made in response to public comments/concerns are identified in Table 2.1.

3. Consultation with Agencies

3.1 Agencies

Consultation with relevant government agencies including provincial ministries, local municipalities and others was completed as per the REA Regulation and MOE's "Guidance for Preparing the Consultation Report". The following agencies were consulted:

- Ministry of the Environment
- Ministry of Natural Resources
- Ministry of Tourism and Culture
- Raisin Region Conservation Authority
- United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry
- Township of South Glengarry

The following section provides the details of the consultation completed with each agency.

3.1.1 *Ontario Ministry of Environment*

- Draft Project Description Reports were sent to the MOE on April 5, 2010 in order to commence the REA process. This step kicks off the REA process by requesting from the MOE the list of Aboriginal communities with whom Northland will be required to consult.
- Representatives of Northland and Hatch met with staff from the MOE's Head Office in Toronto, Ontario on April 16, 2010 to discuss the requirements of the Renewable Energy Approvals Process. Northland met with the Director of the Approvals Program and the Supervisor of Renewable Energy Approvals. The purpose of the meeting was to gain greater clarity on the timing and requirements of several aspects of the REA process.
- The MOE provided comments on the Draft Project Description Report in early May 2010. The Project Description Report was revised to meet these comments, and provided to the MOE on May 11, 2010.
- The list of Aboriginal communities with whom Northland will be required to consult was provided by the MOE on July 26, 2010 (see Appendix H).
- On August 4, 2010, the Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project and Public Meeting was sent to the Ministry of the Environment. The Notice of the Second Public Meeting was sent on July 5, 2011. The Notice of Final Public Meeting was sent on July 28, 2011.
- On October 6, 2010, representatives of Northland and Hatch met with the MOE's Director of Approvals at the MOE's Head Office in Toronto, Ontario. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss, in greater detail, the requirements of the REA Application so that Northland would have clear understanding of the MOE's expectations.

Appendix F contains copies of correspondence between Hatch and the MOE.

3.1.2 Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources

- In May, 2010, Hatch requested a meeting with MNR Kemptville to discuss the Projects. Based on workloads and staffing, MNR Kemptville declined to meet and requested that an Information Request be submitted on June 4, 2010
- On June 12, 2010, an information request was electronically submitted to Kemptville MNR office.
- On July 6, 2010, Hatch again requested a meeting with MNR Kemptville to discuss the Projects following completion of the site investigations. MNR Kemptville again declined to meet, and stated that they would be willing to have a meeting following submission of the draft Natural Heritage Assessment reports.
- On July 12, 2010, Hatch received the completed information request for the Glendale Project from MNR Kemptville. The information request identified natural features and species at risk/species of conservation concern that should be considered during the site investigations.
- On August 18, 2010 copies of the Natural Heritage Records Review, Site Investigation Report, Evaluation of Significant, and Environmental Impact Study were provided to MNR Kemptville for review.
- On September 17, 2010, representatives of Northland and Hatch met with MNR Kemptville to review the Projects. Preliminary comments on the reports were made at that time.
- On October 22, 2010, updated reports were provided to MNR Kemptville which addressed comments made during the meeting on September 17, 2010.
- In response to comments provided on other Northland Power solar projects within Kemptville District, updated reports were provided to MNR Kemptville on June 21, 2011.
- Additional comments on the revised reports were provided by MNR Kemptville on June 29, 2011, with updated reports provided back to MNR Kemptville on July 5, 2011.
- MNR Kemptville provided their confirmation letter of the Natural Heritage Reports on July 8, 2011.

Appendix F contains copies of correspondence between Hatch and the MNR.

3.1.3 Ontario Ministry of Tourism and Culture

- Archaeological Research Associates Ltd. (ARA) submitted an Archaeological Assessment Report entitled 'Stage 1 and 2 Archaeological Assessment Glendale Solar Project' to the Ontario Ministry of Tourism and Culture (MTC) in August, 2010. The Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment Report recommended that the locations with potential to be archaeologically significant be subjected to a Stage 3 Archaeological Assessment.
- Following additional consultation with the MTC, including a meeting at the MTC's offices on October 12, 2010, the 'Stage 1 and 2 Archaeological Assessment Glendale Solar Project' was revised such that the report recommended setbacks from that the locations with potential to be archaeologically significant to ensure no impact on the potentially significant features. The Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment Report concluded that the locations with potential to be

archaeological significant lie well away from lands and could be properly protected such that there would no further assessment required. A final revision of this report was re-submitted by ARA to the MTC in January, 2011.

- On January 10, 2011, the MTC responded that the archaeological assessment undertaken for the Project complies with the Ontario Heritage Act's licensing requirements, including the license terms and conditions and the Ministry's 1993 Archaeological Assessment Technical Guidelines. This letter is included in Appendix F.
- As a result of the addition of new lands to the Project location, ARA submitted an Archaeological Assessment Report entitled 'Stage 1 and 2 Archaeological Assessments Glendale Solar Project Additional Lands' to the Ontario Ministry of Tourism and Culture (MTC) on July 21, 2011. The Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment Report did not result in the discovery of any archaeological materials of cultural heritage value or interest.
- On July 27, 2011, the MTC responded that the archaeological assessment undertaken for the additional lands for the Project complies with the Ontario Heritage Act's licensing requirements, including the license terms and conditions and the Ministry's 1993 Archaeological Assessment Technical Guidelines. This letter is included in Appendix F.

3.1.4 Raisin Region Conservation Authority

- Hatch submitted a Property Inquiry request to the Raisin Region Conservation Authority (RRCA) in June 2010 for information on natural heritage and water body features on or within 120 m of the Project location.
- A letter was sent to Hatch by the RRCA on June 13, 2010 in response to the Property Inquiry. The RRCA identified setbacks from watercourses, shorelines or wetlands, and any records of natural features or waterbodies.

Appendix F contains copies of correspondence between Hatch and the RRCA.

3.1.5 United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry

- On July 8, 2010, Hatch sent an email containing the municipal consultation form and Project Description Report was sent to the Clerk of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry (UCSDG), and copied to Michael Otis, the County Planner.
- On July 22, 2010, Hatch met with Michael Otis, Ben DeHaan and Jack Sullivan of UCSDG. Hatch provided general information on the Project. UCSDG provided information from Schedule B of their official plan, which included information relating to presence of organic soils and significant woodlands on the subject property (the map provided is included in Appendix G). UCSDG noted that there was no tree-clearing by-law within the County. UCSDG also noted requirements around entrance and sign permits, and requested a stormwater management study. UCSDG noted that there was no planned expansion in the area for subdivisions, and the area was low residential and more industrial in use; therefore the Project would likely have no potential impact on land use planning.
- On August 4, 2010, the Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project and Public Meeting, along with a was sent to the Clerk and Michael Otis of UCSDG. The Notice of the

Second Public Meeting was sent on July 5, 2011. The Notice of Final Public Meeting and copies of the draft REA documents were sent on July 28, 2011.

- Prior to the Second Public Meeting, representatives of Northland and Hatch again met with Michael Otis, Ben DeHaan and Jack Sullivan of UCSDG. UCSDG again noted the requirement for an access permit, and commented that the identified entrance location in the layout appeared suitable. UCSDG further indicated that they would accept equivalent stormwater discharge to what is presently discharged. UCSDG also noted that there are load restrictions in the area, and requested that the construction routes be identified.
- To date, UCSDG has not completed the municipal consultation form for the Project.

Appendix G contains any correspondence with the municipality.

3.1.6 Township of South Glengarry

- On June 16, 2010, representatives of Hatch and Northland met with Joanne Haley, General Manager – Community Services, and Dwayne Crawford, Director of Development and Chief Building Official, with the Township of South Glengarry. The following items were discussed:
 - ♦ Noted that entrance permit off of County Road 44 would require a permit from UCSDG.
 - ♦ Building permit will be required for foundations for panels and inverters/transformers
 - ♦ Public consultation was discussed (locations for public meetings, suitable newspapers for publications)
 - ♦ Noted that there is no tree-cutting by-law, but there are policies within the Official Plan to protect tree cover.
 - ♦ Noted that there is no permit required for fencing, however there are regulations/standards
 - ♦ Northland provided information on the Project and anticipated construction practices.
- On July 8, 2010, Hatch sent an email containing the municipal consultation form and Project Description Report was sent to the Clerk of the Township, and copied to Joanne Haley and Dwayne Crawford.
- On August 4, 2010, the Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project and Public Meeting, along with a was sent to the Clerk and Michael Otis of UCSDG. The Notice of the Second Public Meeting was sent on July 5, 2011. The Notice of Final Public Meeting and copies of the draft REA documents were sent on July 28, 2011.
- Prior to the Second Public Meeting, representatives of Northland and Hatch again met with Joanne Haley of the Township. Northland provided information on the fencing for the Project and discussed potential for visual impacts. The Township stated that they had received no information from the community on the proposed Project, and also provided additional information around requirements for building permits.
- To date, the Township has not completed the municipal consultation form for the Project.

Appendix G contains any correspondence with the municipality.

4. Consultation with Aboriginal Communities

It is the Crown's fiduciary obligation to conduct meaningful consultation in good faith with First Nation and Aboriginal communities. The Crown has delegated some of the consultation to the Proponent of renewable energy projects as per the REA Regulation. Pursuant to O. Reg. 359/09, Proponents are required to engage meaningfully with Aboriginal groups regarding traditional ecological knowledge, traditional land use, land claims and other interests and issues with respect to the development of the Project.

The MOE guidance document titled "*Draft Aboriginal Consultation Guide for preparing a Renewable Energy Approval (REA) Application*" (MOE, 2011b) provides information and guidance on Aboriginal consultation. The information presented in this guide is incorporated into this report, where required.

The following provides information related to the Aboriginal consultation completed for the Project.

4.1 Aboriginal Community Consultation List

On April 5, 2010, Northland Power provided the MOE with the Draft Project Description Report. As per the REA Regulation, the submission of the Project Description Report is required in order for the MOE to provide a list of the Aboriginal communities that Northland is to consult with.

The MOE provided comments on the Draft Project Description Report in early May 2010. The Project Description Report was revised to meet these comments, and provided to the MOE on May 11, 2010.

On July 26, 2010 MOE provided the list of Aboriginal communities, which is included in Appendix H.

4.2 Consultation Activities

4.2.1 First Public Meeting and Notice

The combined Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Project and Notice of a Public Meeting was sent to the Aboriginal communities on the MOE list on August 4, 2010.

With the Notice, a letter was included which, as per the REA Regulation, requested written information regarding any potential impact on treaty or constitutional protected lands and possible mitigating measures. Appendix I contains copies of the letters.

The combined Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project and Notice of Public Meeting was also placed in the *Akwesasne Notes and Indian Times* on Thursday, August 5, 2010 and again on Thursday, August 12, 2010 (Appendix B). This newspaper has circulation within the Mohawks of Akwesasne.

No individuals who attended the first public meeting identified themselves as members of any Aboriginal community. Section 2.3.1 above provides information on the first public meeting.

The Notice and Draft Project Description Report were posted on the Project website, northlandpower.ca/glendale, at the same time the Notice was published. The PDR was also made available for public review at the Township of South Glengarry municipal office 30 days prior to the first public meeting.

4.2.2 Second Public Meeting and Notice

The combined Updated Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Project and Notice of a Public Meeting was sent to the Aboriginal communities on the MOE list on July 5, 2011.

With the Notice, a letter was included which, as per the REA Regulation, requested written information regarding any potential impact on treaty or constitutional protected lands and possible mitigating measures. Appendix I contains copies of the letters.

The combined Updated Notice of Proposal to Engage in a Renewable Energy Project and Notice of Public Meeting was also placed in the *Akwesasne Notes and Indian Times* on Thursday, July 7, 2011 and again on Thursday, July 14, 2011 (Appendix B).

No individuals who attended the second public meeting identified themselves as members of any Aboriginal community. Section 2.3.1 above provides information on second public meeting.

The Notice and updated Draft Project Description Report were posted on the Project website, northlandpower.ca/glendale, at the same time the Notice was published. The updated PDR was also made available for public review at the Township of South Glengarry municipal office 30 days prior to the second public meeting.

4.2.3 Final Public Meeting and Notice

On July 28, 2011, after all Project documents were drafted and letters of confirmation were received from MNR and MTC, the Aboriginal communities on the MOE's list were sent summaries of all reports and copies of all Project Reports, as per the requirements of REA Regulation.

The Notice of Final Public Meeting was also placed in the *Akwesasne Notes and Indian Times* on Thursday, August 4, 2011 and again on Thursday, September 8, 2011 (Appendix B).

Additionally, all Aboriginal communities were sent the Notice of Final Public Meeting and an accompanying letter on July 28, 2011. Appendix I contains copies of the Notice and the letters

Section 2.3.2 provides the details of the final public meeting. No attendees at the final public meeting identified themselves as members of any Aboriginal community.

4.3 Other Aboriginal Consultation Activities

After each Aboriginal community received the summaries of the Project documents and the Project documents, Hatch contacted each Aboriginal community. They were contacted to ensure that they received the reports and to determine if they had any comments or concerns. Appendix J contains any correspondence with the Aboriginal communities.

The details of the communications and activities for each Aboriginal community are contained in Table 4.1.

5. Conclusions

Since May 2010, the consultation program for the Glendale Solar Project has been active. There has been open dialogue with the public, agencies, Aboriginal groups and the local municipalities regarding the Project. In addition to communications via email, letters, meetings and phone calls, there was an initial first public meeting, and then more detailed second and final public meetings hosted by Northland to further encourage discussion and comment on the Project. The purpose of this Consultation Report is to ensure a transparent and meaningful consultation process for all participants with an interest in the Project, where all comments and questions received are documented, reviewed and addressed.

As a result of these opportunities for comment, several issues were raised that have been considered as part of the Project assessment, and provided additional guidance toward the scope of the studies. These issues were considered and incorporated into the REA application documents and the Project design, as appropriate.





August 2010 HIICAP UPDATE



One of the most frequently seen forms we see at the HIICAP office is the Medicare Summary Notice or MSN. The Medicare Summary Notice is NOT a bill. This is the notice you get after the doctor, provider, or pharmacy files a claim for Medicare

services. It explains what services were billed to Medicare, what Medicare will pay, and what if anything the beneficiary can be billed for. The MSN also outlines other important information, such as deductible and co-insurance amounts, benefit days, and how to file an appeal. Your doctor's office or hospital will send a bill after Medicare pays its part. Prescription costs are taken care of when you receive your prescription. Medicare Summary Notices are normally mailed out every three months.

What should you look for on your MSN?

1. Check that that Medicare number on the MSN matches the number on your Medicare card.
2. Verify that your name and address are correct. Contact the Social Security office to make corrections.
3. Verify you received the goods and services being billed to Medicare. Billions of dollars from the Medicare program is lost to fraud.

Common Medicare fraud includes:

- Billing for goods and services not provided
- Billing for old items as new items
- Billing for visits that didn't take place
- Billing for more hours than there are in day
- Falsifying credentials and double billing



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

Akwesasne Museum and Cultural Center seeks community input

Setting the goal towards cultural fluency

The Akwesasne Museum has been an active source for information on the topic of Kanienkeha culture and the history of Akwesasne and its community members. Museum staff has organized workshops to allow community members of all ages to learn about traditional crafts and practices in a supportive environment. These workshops have been planned based on information obtained in surveys generated on the website SurveyMonkey.com which included input from the entire territory of Akwesasne.

The Akwesasne Museum was successful in obtaining two separate grants, one with the National Park Services and another with the Institute of Museum and Library Services. The latter program provided grant money to work with the community to develop plans for improved services to the community through the building of a new facility. A series of community meetings have been held to date to allow for the community to provide guidance and feedback on what they want to see in the services of the Akwesasne Museum.

"This project is really at the beginning stage and we are trying to have as many voices heard as possible," said Museum Director Sue Ellen Herne. "The committee provides regular updates to the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe, Mohawk Council of Akwesasne and the Mohawk Nation Council of Chiefs."

These updates create a partnership between the governments while keeping the door open for all community members to provide feedback on this project. The last meeting of the community committee will be held in August, with the date yet to be set. A final report of the findings with clear options should be developed later in the fall of this year. This report should show the concepts of what a potential museum could look like, as well as services that it can provide to the community.

"We don't want something that will hurt more than help our people and we will be using the most environmentally responsible materials and ideas," said

Herne.

The most important part of this process is including the community on the initial phase. This museum would not be the typical mainstream concept. By creating our own facility and programming the community can ensure that ancestors are honored in the process.

The second grant allows for the development and implementation of a survey that will gauge what the community already knows about culture, language, and traditional knowledge, hunting, fishing and plants/gardening. This will serve as a tool to determine the validity of statements that are often made like the District of Tsi Snaihne possessing the highest number of fluent speakers within the different parts of the territory.

The idea behind this survey was initially sparked during the process of the previous survey to see what types of classes' community members are interested in having at the museum.

"This survey will help us to get solid answers about what has actually been lost," said Director Herne. "We are also thinking about how this can benefit other organizations that might need this information and who it can be useful to."

Once this survey is ready to be brought to the public additional staff will be temporarily brought on board to manage the survey. They will send out the online link to their network of contacts, as well as implement a cold-calling system around Akwesasne to conduct the survey over the phone. In the event that someone does not feel comfortable with taking the survey over the phone they can stop into the museum and fill it out in person. Elders have additional access to the survey, as these temporary surveyors will be available to meet in their homes to complete the survey.

The goal of both of these projects is to get Akwesasronon to the point that they are culturally fluent – being able to explain our situation without confusion.

- People should listen to the M.C. as he will announce the different songs and will also let people know when they can dance and when they cannot. He will also give you other information and news.

Solar Technology

A solar photovoltaic (PV) module (or panel, as they are often called) transforms the sun's energy into electrical energy. Silicon, a semi-conductor, is the material that transforms a ray of sunshine into electricity. The silicon is located within a grid (commonly made of metal) that conducts electricity. When the sunlight hits the silicon, electrons flow from the silicon into the grid, thereby producing electricity. The silicon and metallic grid are located beneath a layer of glass to provide weather protection. The glass has a special coating applied to maximize the capture of sunlight by the panel, thereby reducing glare.

Advantages of Solar Energy

Solar power has a multitude of advantages compared to most other power generation technologies.

- First and foremost, the fuel is free. As the cost of many fossil fuels is expected to increase in the future, having solar energy on the grid at a set price will give greater stability to future energy prices.


Ontario's Feed-in-Tariff (FIT) program was launched by the Ontario Power Authority on October 1, 2009 to encourage the development of renewable energy resources and to stimulate growth in green technology and renewable power industries.

The Ontario Power Authority awarded 184 FIT contracts to renewable power developers in Ontario on April 8, 2010. Northland Power was awarded a total of 13 contracts for proposed solar ground-mount developments throughout the province. These projects are currently proceeding through the REA process.

The REA process entails consideration of environmental aspects, including natural heritage features and water bodies, as well as heritage and archaeological resources. In addition, the REA process includes public, government agency and First Nation consultation.


The proposed Glendale Solar Project is considered to be a Class 3 solar facility, as defined under the Environmental Protection Act (Act) Part V0.1 and Ontario Regulation 359/09. Class 3 solar facilities are defined as having a name plate capacity of 10 kilowatts (kW) or greater and the solar panels are mounted on the ground. Specifically, this proposed Project has a nameplate capacity of 10MW (ac).

The proposed Project will use crystalline technology photovoltaic (PV) panels installed on ground-mounted rack structures made of steel and aluminum. The panels will be tilted and fixed in place (i.e., they will not move to track the sun). The project will consist of approximately 50,000 panels and will be designed to optimize energy production.

Natural Heritage Features

As per Ontario Regulation 359/09, a records review and a site investigation were conducted in order to identify environmental features of the Project site and surrounding area. A variety of features were identified and considered during this process, including but not limited to the following:

- Wildlife/Wildlife habitat
- Vegetation communities, including woodlands and wetlands
- Valleylands
- Species at risk
- Waterbodies

Terrestrial Environment

The Project site is composed of open hayfields, woodlands, and meadow marsh/swamp communities.

Woodlands on the Project site are deciduous in nature, and most commonly included poplars, maples, ash and elms. The woodlands on the Project site are connected with larger wooded areas located adjacent to the Project site.

White-tailed deer, coyote, red-tailed hawk, and American Robin were recorded on the Project site.

Butternut, a deciduous species of tree of the walnut family, were recorded on the Project site. Butternut are listed as Endangered under the Species at Risk Act and the Endangered Species Act. Some removal of Butternut may be required for construction of the Project. If it is determined that removal is required, a permit will be obtained from the Ministry of Natural Resources under the Endangered Species Act to conduct this clearing. It is anticipated that such a permit would require compensation planting of Butternut in the area and follow-up monitoring. Overall, the use of such measures would ensure a net benefit on Butternut as a result of the Project.

Aquatic Environment

There is only one water body on the Project site, being a tributary of the Glen Falloch drain that originates on the northern part of the property. It runs into the main branch of the Glen Falloch Drain approximately 300 m east of the Project site. A tributary of the Raisin River originates in an excavated drainage channel approximately 75 m east of the southeast corner of the Project site.

I'm filling out this comment sheet because my wife and I are the nearest property owners to the planned solar plant. We live and own the adjacent property to the west, including the three fields that are shown in your satellite image which will be impacted by the development. As a matter of fact, the landowner leasing the land will be less affected visually.

We attended the public forum to get more information. In so doing we attained the address of the solar facility near Arnprior to see if we should be concerned. We visited this site and determined that it was quite an eyesore replacing the natural landscape. The inverters seemed to be encased in small buildings which may help with any noise output. We couldn't hear any noise although it wasn't a sunny day, so I'm not sure how much was working. We also spoke to a few neighbours who didn't find noise to be an issue other than when they cut the grass around the panels. The neighbours did say it was an eyesore and claimed their property values had dropped considerably.

We bought our property because of the surrounding zoning, and natural beauty that the woodlands offered. We invested a lot of money into our home. We were diligent in checking the neighbouring properties with our legal counsel before purchasing. The areas adjacent to us are zoned rural, and therefore didn't qualify for this type of project (solar plant) as per the South Glengarry official plan. We also took into account our zoning which will allow us to subdivide the three fields and create a subdivision. Our location (mainly our three fields), is prime land for a subdivision due to its proximity to town. This was to provide us with a retirement income.

Our biggest concerns are the devalued property and the loss of retirement income. I wouldn't be able to take the risk to subdivide because it has been proven in practice by the real estate business, that existing homes aren't selling near solar plants unless the price drops twenty to thirty percent. You don't need a study to see what's really happening. There would be no interest by potential homeowners to invest money for the construction of a new home adjacent to such a project.


